A MESSAGE TO OUR COMMUNITY

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

I want to share some important news that you may not be aware of. Response, Inc. has decided to sell our long-standing combined shelter/office facility here in Shenandoah County. The building has been at the heart of our work for many years. Still, separating our office and shelter space is a necessary step to provide more comprehensive services to our community, and the costs of maintaining such a large building do not serve our new goals.

This decision does not mean that survivors will be left without safe housing. Our emergency shelter services will continue—just in different ways that are more sustainable and flexible. And all of our other programs—court advocacy, prevention education, youth support, and outreach—remain strong and available to anyone who needs them.

I know many of you contributed generously to build a playground at the shelter. Please know those funds are being carefully set aside. When we find a new permanent location, we are committed to creating that safe and welcoming space for children. That vision is still very much alive.

Another reality I want to share with you is that, over the past six years, federal funding for programs like ours has steadily declined. Response has always relied heavily on federal and state grants. Still, now we must increasingly lean on the support of our local community—our neighbors, businesses, and civic groups—to keep this lifeline strong.

Despite these changes, one thing has not changed: Response is here, and we will continue to stand with survivors of domestic and sexual violence. With your help, we can ensure safety, healing, and hope remain available to everyone who needs it.



VIOLENCE PREVENTION STARTS AT HOME

Every home has the power to shape a safer, more respectful community, and it starts with the way we teach and model healthy relationships. Children and teens learn how to treat others by watching the adults in their lives. They're shaped by how we handle conflict, express emotions, and talk about relationships. That's why parents and caregivers play such a powerful role in stopping violence before it starts. Violence prevention should not only be talked about by professionals in certain places, but it should also be talked about between family members in the car on the way to practice, in the kitchen cooking a healthy meal, or on the couch binge-watching your favorite series.

Here are a few simple ways to build a violence-free future at home:

- Model respect in your words and actions, even during disagreements. Children notice how you speak to your partner, family members, and even strangers.
- Talk openly about feelings and boundaries. Encourage kids to express themselves clearly and respectfully, and to listen when others do the same.
- Challenge harmful stereotypes. Boys can be gentle. Girls can be leaders. Everyone deserves respect, regardless of gender, race, or background.
- Teach healthy conflict skills. Show that it's okay to be upset and that we can work through problems without yelling, threats, or silence.

By creating a home environment built on trust, empathy, and open communication, we equip the next generation with the tools they need to build healthy relationships of their own. Violence prevention isn't just a program — it's a daily practice.

LA VISA U

La Visa U es una visa de no inmigrante creada para proteger a víctimas de ciertos delitos que colaboran con la policía o autoridades en investigaciones o juicios. Fue establecida en el 2000 bajo la Ley de Protección de las Víctimas de la Trata y la Violencia. Además de ofrecer estatus legal temporal, en algunos casos puede llevar a la residencia permanente.

¿Quién califica?

Pueden solicitarla las personas que:

- Han sufrido abuso físico o mental a causa de delitos como violencia doméstica, agresión sexual, trata de personas, u otros delitos graves.
- Han colaborado o están dispuestas a colaborar con las autoridades.
- Menores de 16 años o personas con discapacidad pueden ser representados por un padre, tutor o adulto de confianza.

Beneficios

- Hasta 4 años de estatus legal y autorización de trabajo en EE. UU.
- Posibilidad de solicitar residencia permanente (tarjeta verde) después de 3 años de presencia continua.

Proceso y limitaciones

La solicitud requiere el Formulario I-918 y una certificación de la policía. Debido a la alta demanda, existe un límite anual de Visas U, lo que puede causar largos tiempos de espera.

Conclusión

Individuals

La Visa U brinda protección y una oportunidad de estabilidad a víctimas de delitos mientras apoyan la iusticia.
